Celebrating 75 Years

SIGNATURE EVENTS AND ACTIVITIES

Take a look back at Mount Prospect Public Library's history during our 75th Anniversary year in 2018 with short stories that highlight our commitment to the Arts, Service, Technology, and Community. These themes point to the amazing number of opportunities MPPL has made available to residents at every stage in life throughout the changes of the last 75 years.

World War II Hardships Did Not Stop Residents From Supporting Funds for Library

Despite the war, the population of Mount Prospect had grown from 1,710 in 1940 to about 3,000 in 1943. The young Library received much assistance from the Chicago Public Library in the form of professional suggestions, furniture, and books. Chicago Public gave the Library 1,000 books for \$200 per year, which it then gave back to enable the purchase of children's books. This help continued for twenty years.

In an original draft of a letter dated January 22, 1943 from the Mount Prospect Men's Club to members of other civic organizations in the village, E. H. Clevon, Civic Service Chairman of the club, discusses the Men's Club participation in the drive to establish a tax-supported public Library. Included in the letter are facts about the current Library and information about how the new Library would be funded

and governed. In it, he noted that the Library has about 650 cardholders who took out 100 to 200 books per week and that it had no encyclopedias, dictionaries, maps, papers, or magazines.

In another letter, Clevon aimed to convince residents that "you cannot afford not to have" a tax-funded Library, noting that they pay \$27.04 per year for a morning and evening paper subscription but a Library would cost them \$1.90 per year. "A Library is a poor man's university and a free man's inspiration," he said, listing the local service, veterans', and religious organizations that were part of the campaign for a tax-supported Library.

The vote was 489 for and 212 against the tax. In 1944 the Library moved to a paint store at 115 South Main Street as it was the only store open at night. A 1947 brochure touts the Library's biography collection, including the life stories of Catherine the Great, Paul Revere, Vincent van Gogh, Marie Curie, Josef Stalin, and Alexander Hamilton.

Library Building Reflects Village Population Growth

The first Library building was erected at 14 East Busse Avenue with money both donated and raised from the approval of a bond issue in 1949. Between 1962 and 1965 two additions were made to the building, tripling the floor space. In 1974 the Village purchased the Central School property on the corner of Emerson Street and Central Road. The

new Library opened its doors in 1976 and featured an automated circulation system.

Between 1987 and 1995, the Library board asked Mount Prospect residents to approve referenda to construct a larger building, but were turned down each time. During those years, Library staff shifted resources around to create space and to accommodate the growing demand for public computers and audiovisual materials.

Inspired by the release of the movie version of *Ready Player One*, a dystopian fantasy where players in a massive virtual reality game search for a hidden fortune, MPPL created an online and real-world scavenger hunt that had patrons trying for high scores on classic video games to unlock clues. The quest then went into the Library where everyone was on the lookout for 3-D printed keys. While a millionaire's riches were not at stake, winners did receive AMC gift cards.

To give patrons the chance to experiment with virtual reality in, well, reality, the Ready Player One Extravaganza offered a chance to try Oculus Rift™ and PlayStation® Classic video games such as *Pac-Man* were also available, and patrons saw a demonstration of the zSpace interactive 3-D technology that lets kids virtually dissect frogs, play tennis, create models, and more.


Ask About Our Homebound Delivery Service!
