


National Library Week Trivia Winners!

The Library Foundation hosted its signature Mini Golf fundraising event on March 2. The perfect antidote to cabin fever, the Library greeted more than 430 golfers of all ages for the annual adventure.

This year's course was designed on both levels to take players on a journey throughout the Library. Approximately 20 area businesses sponsored the event. Some sponsors were exceptionally creative with decorations and themes: players escaped to a tropical beach, traveled under the sea, and then they found a rainbow within the Library stacks. The event also included a replica of Mount Prospect's iconic Central Schoolhouse, which once housed the Library in the 1930s.

The 19th Hole extended the fun by offering concessions, an exciting raffle, and a hole-in-one game for prizes. Participants also enjoyed a photo booth where many players dressed up in whimsical costumes and snapped pictures. While the Library anticipated the enthusiasm among our golfers for this one-day event, the staff and Foundation also took great care to anticipate the needs of our patrons and designed the course away from designated quiet areas.


At 7 p.m., the preshow introduction begins. Following the play, a discussion and opportunity to interact with the actors




