Movies, Microfiche, and More Open Research to Everyone at the Library

A 1974 report referred to Mount Prospect Public Library as a "fullservice Library" as it offered "microfilm, 8-mm films, 16-mm films, listening center items, self-teaching items, cassettes, records, sound projectors, silent projectors," and more.

As always, these tools came to us with the help of local residents and organizations. According to a 1968 article in *The Prospect Day*, a fund set up in memory of Dorothy Kester purchased the Library's first microfilm reader.

Of course, teaching patrons to use new technologies was the next step. A video produced in the 1980s featured Librarian Priscilla Garvin showing seventh graders how to use the microfilm reader as well as the newer microfiche machine. We maintain one of each in the Harold Weary Genealogy area on the second floor as tools for searching older records.

A snapshot of the Library over its many decades would show different

technologies in use. In 1995, Executive Director Marilyn Genther noted in the Library's newsletter that "technology has made possible different formats such as videos, compact discs, CD-ROMS, as well as online information." According to Genther, these formats were part of a growing recognition that "individuals learn differently and have different educational, informational, and recreational needs."

"Not only can a public library 'change lives," she added. "It can also help to shape a community as it deals with the rapid changes that are occurring."

The format is built around three feature segments, an in-studio interview with the presenter of an upcoming program, and book reviews by staff members. 





Lobby Renovations Bring Patrons New Levels of Service

When change occurs at MPPL, our goal is to serve you better. We know that you appreciate our friendly, professional service, and so we are dedicated to having staff always available to issue a Library card, check



out books, and answer the phone.

Changes are on the way for our front lobby. Some changes are on the way for our front lobby. In the fall, the lobby will be undergoing renovations to increase efficiency, improve traffic flow, and allow more self-service stations.

Neither the Library nor the lobby will need to close during the construction, and all services will be available. Any disruptions will be posted and communicated clearly. And, of course, staff will always be available to assist you.

The renovations will divide the lobby into two zones: a staffed service desk and a self-service area.

The staffed desk will include both the Registration and Circulation functions, where you can check out materials, get questions answered about materials or about Library services, register for programs, and obtain or renew your Library card.

The self-service zone will contain self-checkout machines and a shelving area where patrons can pick up hold items (which will be covered for privacy) as well as express public Neither the Library nor the lobby will need to close during the construction, and all services will be available. And, of course, staff will always be available to assist you.

"All patrons will find that the new lobby meets their needs, whether they need to talk to a staff member or just want to quickly pick up or check out their materials," said Executive Director Marilyn Genther.

"The upgrades will offer patrons more options and choice in how they use the Library."

Continuing through the lobby, new public art will mark the entrance way to Youth Services. This new portal "will set the stage for childrens' visits to their special space," said Genther, sparking their imagination with organic elements and a new mural depicting plants and animals native to Illinois.


