Executive Director Reynders Joins MPPL

The staff and the Board of Trustees warmly welcome Su Reynders as the new executive director of the Mount Prospect Public Library. Reynders took the helm of the Library July 1.

Following a broad search, the Board of Trustees voted in April to hire Reynders following the former Executive Director Marilyn Genther's retirement announcement this past January.

Reynders comes to MPPL with extensive experience in both libraries and the private sector, most recently serving the Lincolnwood Public Library District as executive director since 2012. Previously, she worked at Reaching Across Illinois Library System as associate executive director, as well as

Metropolitan Library System in a range of positions, including executive director, director of operations, and special projects coordinator.

"The Mount Prospect Public Library has an established history of providing excellent library services," said Reynders. "I am excited to build on the Library's successes so that we can continue to delight the community."

Before working in libraries, Reynders worked for Technology Asset Management as an asset management consulting manager and at IBM as a senior implementation specialist.

The Library will host an open house July 18 at 5:30 p.m. to allow members of the community to meet Reynders.

18 Years and **Happy Trails** for Trustee **Everett**

After nearly two decades of board service, Jane Everett's final meeting with the Library Board of Trustees was May 16. With an impending move to Arizona, Everett chose not run for reelection in the Consolidated Elections in April.

Everett served the board for 18 years, including all executive offices and committees. She most recently chaired the executive director search committee.

Looking back on her service, she notes significant changes that took place during her tenure: the Main Library expansion, the opening of South Branch, and a recent lobby redesign. She stresses how important it was to ensure there were enough meeting rooms to serve the community during the second floor renovation in 2015 in the Main Library.

Most of all, Everett values the strong relationships she developed with the Board and staff.

"The Library is the gem of the

Village," said Everett. "It's not just what the Library offers, but the people. It's so strong in the community."

The Call to Service

Raised in Peoria, Ill., Everett moved to Mount Prospect with her husband where they raised their daughter. She worked as a public school librarian.

Everett's Board service began with a simple phone call from a neighbor about a trustee opening on the Library Board during the 2001 election; he asked if she would like to run for office. That encouragement came from Bill Blaine, former longtime Library Trustee and founding member of the Foundation.

"I asked, 'What do I need to do?'

Visit the South Branch of the Mount Prospect Public Library, and staff will immediately tell you that the friendly, bright space is "your library."

Patrons quickly discover this, too.

Housed in a convenient strip mall at the busy corner of Algonquin and Busse Roads, the South Branch directs area residents to a host of amenities in the area in addition to offering a full range of library services. From obtaining a library card to accessing free WiFi to finding resources for children and adults, the South Branch is the go-to place for many local residents. Popular areas of the Library include

computer stations, a train table and games for children, a photocopier, and a fax machine.

In honor of its 10-year anniversary, the Community Connections Center will host a community-wide celebration on Saturday, August 17, from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. at its location at 1711 W. Algonquin Road. The event will include live music, entertainment, and food. Tents and outdoor seating will be available.

Small Beginnings, Big Dreams

The Village of Mount Prospect and MPPL opened in 2009 the Community Connections Center. The Center houses the South Branch and provided access to the Village's human services and police departments, and access to other social service organizations. From the start, the Library staff and the Community Connections Center succeeded beyond expectations to bring a variety of services and programs to the local community.

"We have an incredible relationship with our community that has been built on honesty and trust," said South Branch Manager Maria Garstecki. "People know us by our names. We [the staff] can be anywhere and someone will stop us to say,

'You are from the Library!"

Garstecki attributes this familiarity to the small-town feeling of the South Branch.

"The size of our space makes it easy for us to spot a patron who needs assistance," said Garstecki. "We can sense right away if people want to ask a question."

However, the staff is very careful to respect people's space when they want help and when they don't, according to South Branch Program Coordinator Allison Smith Hahn.

Staff at South Branch are bilingual in Spanish and English, as well as other languages, such as Polish. One of the most popular programs at the Community Connections Center is Play and Learn, an international program that incorporates many languages. It is a result of the Village and Library staff working together and collaborating to provide a dynamic program. South Branch also offers many programs for the whole family to enjoy and to meet neighbors, including movie and game nights.

"It takes compassion and understanding to help people feel comfortable," said Garstecki.

Smith Hahn agreed.

"I am humbled by the compassion of our patrons. Sometimes miscommunication happens, but our patrons have grace and patience. It's a two-way street," said Smith Hahn.

Something for Everyone

Last year South Branch expanded its successful one-on-one learning sessions, including Mango Language Labs and eresources to help patrons with their language skills.

"We try to have something for everyone," said Garstecki. "By being a part of the Mount Prospect Public Library, we have access to everything the Main Library has, which is important for our patrons and community to know."

Anyone with an MPPL library card can use the South Branch, and can order items to be delivered to South Branch instead of the Main Library. If a patron requests a hold before 9 p.m. and the item is available at

the Main Library, it will arrive at South Branch by 3 p.m. the next day. Patrons can also return materials to South Branch, even if they checked them out at the Main Library. Convenience is also a reason for some residents to use South Branch facilities.

Partnerships and Resources

South Branch enjoys a strong partnership with the Village in its outreach throughout the community to combine events and reading programs. This is illustrated by working with the police department during Kickin' it with the Cops Summer Soccer Program or storytimes in Spanish and Polish at Early Learning Center at Dist. 59 and La Michoacana ice cream parlor.

"Everything is connected to the space we have," said Garstecki. "From the community room we share with Community Connections Center, to the partnerships we have developed, it all allows us to offer excellent programming and a vision that this is 'Your Library' for our patrons."

Have Hotspot, Will Travel

Going on a trip or attending a conference and need internet capability? The Mount Prospect Public Library recently introduced a mobile hotspot pilot program for its patrons. A mobile hotspot allows a person to access the internet through mobile devices, such as a laptop or a smartphone. The Library's hotspots provide internet access through Sprint's 4G LTE network.

Ten hotspot kits are available for checkout at the Patron Services for a two-week period. Each kit includes a mobile hotspot, a micro-USB charger, and instructions.

"Our patrons asked for this service, and we want to connect people to resources," said Dale Heath, head of Research Services. "It's a way to extend the internet to people wherever they may be or if they have limited data plans."

To check out a kit, patrons must be MPPL cardholders in good standing, at least age 18, and sign a borrowing agreement.

What motivated you to serve as a Trustee at MPPL? How do you hope to contribute?


