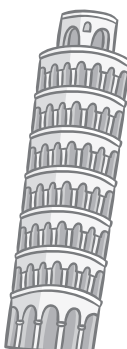

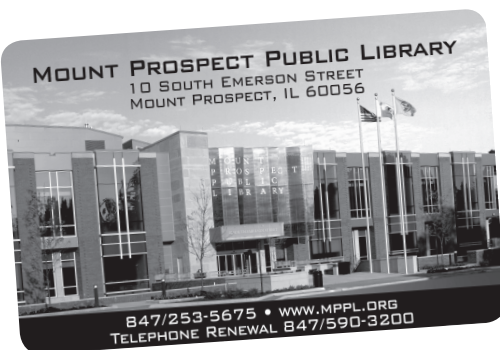

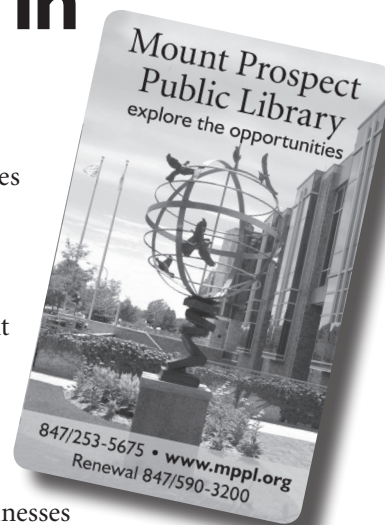
Your Library Card is worth more in September!
