

The year 2008 may be remembered for many things—a historic presidential election, the Beijing Olympics, the economic downturn—but, here at the Library, we will remember it as the year we set new records. Possibly spurred on

by the economy, the people of Mount Prospect rediscovered the Library and all we have to offer. In 2008, we greeted almost half a million visitors, more than enough to fill all the seats in Soldier Field, U.S. Cellular Field, Wrigley Field, and the Prospect High School Stadium three times over.

Today the Library is a vibrant hub of activity where people come to explore their interests in a variety of ways. It is a gathering place and an entertainment

complex. It is not only a place to borrow books and DVDs but a place to attend workshops, computer training classes, and informative seminars. Monthly movies and performers draw crowds of all ages. Current events and book discussion groups

provoke lively debates. Computers provide access to the Internet, online resources, and common applications like Microsoft Word®. Area schools and local organizations hold meetings at the Library. Study rooms are booked with students preparing group projects. Artwork displayed throughout the

building engages the senses and stirs the imagination.

The Library is busier than ever, and we have implemented several strategies to meet the increased demand for our services and materials. We continue to juggle staff schedules to provide greater coverage during high usage periods, and are constantly reviewing our purchasing strategies and negotiating techniques to maximize our buying power so we can ensure the availability of materials. We

Living Between Cultures Suburban Mosaic Books of the Year

Like many communities of the Northwest suburbs, Mount Prospect has been experiencing a growth in diversity—with people from many races and ethnic backgrounds moving into the area. This change in the makeup of our community was the catalyst for the Library, our civic leaders, and our schools to develop a program to address the challenging issues of racial and social inequities, down to the youngest members of our community. The result: the Suburban Mosaic Books of the Year program. Suburban Mosaic is an area-wide book discussion program in which individuals get together to discuss age-appropriate books with story lines that lend themselves to meaningful discussions about racism, religious bigotry, and ethnic hostilities.

This year's theme, Living Between Cultures, builds upon last year's theme of immigration. Each of the following

selections, in some way, focuses on the characters finding their identity by living between cultures. Copies of the books are readily available at the Library.





Are you ready for the transition to digital television on February 17?


If you do not have cable, satellite, or a digital TV, you will need a digital converter box. In other words, if you use an antenna to receive your television signal and you bought your TV before 2008, you will most likely need to purchase a digital converter box. Did you request your converter box coupons yet? The government is offering coupons worth \$40 off the price of a converter box. Each household is entitled to two coupons. Coupons are mailed 2-4 weeks after you apply for them and are valid for 90 days from date of issue. To apply for your coupons, go to www.DTV2009.gov.

Tuesday, February 17, 7:30 p.m.





A penetrating light is shed on the "American way" as seen from two perspectives, those who were born here and those who are still struggling to fit in.
