The American Library Association is reporting that libraries across the country are being recognized as much more than storehouses for books. This trend is reflected here in Mount Prospect as well. MPPL is much more than the sum of its parts because of the people it brings together. The Library is a place where people and relationships are nurtured. Here, the community comes together to learn, discuss, and pursue new interests. New parents are connecting with other parents through our weekly storytimes. Our book discussion groups are flourishing, not only because they offer an opportunity to delve deeper into a book but because they create an environment for people to interact with each other. Craft programs bring people together as they work on new skills (think quilting bees of yesteryear). Educational classes

create group learning environments, where information is shared, not just by the speaker but by fellow classmates as well. Displaced workers are networking with people and resources offered through the Library. The connective thread that brings this whole effort together is a Library staff committed to providing a welcoming and supportive environment. This is what it means to be a community.

Advances in this electronic age are expanding our ability to connect with people thousands of miles away, yet we still yearn for the personal connection that can only come from being faceto-face with our fellow human beings. The Library fosters these relationships within the community.

We still respect our heritage and the power of books and cannot imagine a time when the printed word is no longer relevant. Over the summer we asked Mount Prospect residents to share their stories about how the Library factored into their lives. We heard how the stories housed in our four walls piqued the imagination, inspired action, and stretched minds. We also heard how the Library was a special haven that allowed this experience to happen. Our goal is to marry the two—books and community—to create a place where everyone feels at home.


In Concert: Dan Zahn & Kate Mor Tuesday, December 21, 1:30 p.m.



Every community is a constellation of stars with varying degrees of intensity and spectrum. While we know the stars shine above us, we often take for granted their presence. The Mount Prospect community, and in particular, its young people have a shining star in Rose Allen. Her vision, leadership, and advocacy have given our young people a place to read, research, and build technology skills. Her Teen Advisory Board (TAB) program has given our youth a voice in book selections and library programs.

While Rose may not be as young as the patrons she serves, she certainly shares their enthusiasm for learning and adventure. Perhaps it is Rose's own experience growing up in the segregated Baltimore, Maryland area that has shaped her commitment to creating a collection and library experience where ideas are cherished and tolerance is the norm.

As an LRC Director at Lincoln Middle School in Mount Prospect, I can attest to her commitment to reach beyond the brick walls of the library, and work cooperatively with our school libraries. When the Mount Prospect Public Library began its subscription to Tutor.com, I asked Rose if the Library could come over and show our students how it worked. Rose recruited several of her colleagues and came over to teach our students. When I asked Rose if Tutor.com could be opened earlier, so I could teach students after school, Rose responded and a change was made to open the service at 2 p.m. When I asked Rose to come in to give our 6th, 7th, and 8th graders book talks for summer reading, Rose came to Lincoln with 20-30 books to share. Over the years, Rose has helped me locate quality literature for our school library, coordinated book bags for our teachers with lower-level reading materials, and pulled books on assigned topics. Our teachers have come to rely on her expertise and inspiring book talks.

While it's sad to hear Rose is retiring, I know she's just starting the next phase of her life's journey. We're fortunate she stopped off in Mount Prospect along

Retiring Rose

This December Rose Allen, Young Adult Librarian extraordinaire, will retire. How do you sum up the impact Rose has had on our community? Words such as committed, dedicated, and passionate get tossed around all the time, but Rose truly embodies them.

Rose has been a part of the library community for 37 years. She started her career helping with the bookmobile in a small town in Maryland. As she moved from coast to coast and then to the Midwest, Rose always focused her career on libraries and helping people find informational and recreational materials. Rose's dream had always been to become a degreed librarian, but prior to her settling in the Chicago area, life had always gotten in the way. With the encouragement of her supervisor, Larry D'Urso, Rose decided to pursue her dream. She started at Harper, moved on to Northern Illinois University, and finally earned a Masters of Science in Library and Information Science from the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign. Not one to shy away from challenges, Rose was an early participant in U of I's LEEP program, an online education program that combines very brief periods of oncampus instruction with Internet instruction and independent learning. Back in the mid-90s, this innovative program was one of the first to harness the Internet as a platform for distance learning. Her quest to become a librarian took 10 years and a lot of hard work.

To Rose, her master's degree was more than a piece of paper; it was a platform for making a difference. Rose credits some wonderful mentors for getting her through library school and, as a way of acknowledging the support she received, has become a mentor herself. Within the library community, Rose has

been an active contributor to the American Library Association, Illinois Library Association, Public Library Association, and North Suburban Library System. Her efforts have been recognized through several awards, including the ILA Jane O'Brien Award for outstanding contributions to the library community and the Library School Alumni Association Student award from U of I for "catching the spirit" of the profession. She is also a member of Beta Phi Mu, the library and information studies honor society.

Rose has taken her mentoring efforts down to an individual level taking teens under her wing. "She's an outgoing, friendly role-model who encourages us and introduces us to new ideas," notes Haley Dircks, a senior at Prospect High School who has been a member of the Teen Advisor Board (TAB) since 6th grade. Rose's genuine interest in teens was evident in everything she tackled. From organizing creative craft programs to book discussions to pizza tastings to band competitions, Rose continually demonstrated her commitment to helping Mount Prospect's young people grow and discover the world around them. She reached outside the Library, bringing authors and open mic programs to Starbucks, even joining one teen's Relay for Life team. "She will be missed," said Urszula Tyl, another TAB member. "She was always there when I needed her and gave me great advice."

Libraries foster a community of sharing — sharing of materials and sharing of ideas. Rose Allen has dedicated her life's work to libraries, and these ideals and both the Library community and Mount Prospect are a better place because of Rose. Thank you so much, Rose. We wish you all the best in the next chapter of your life.


