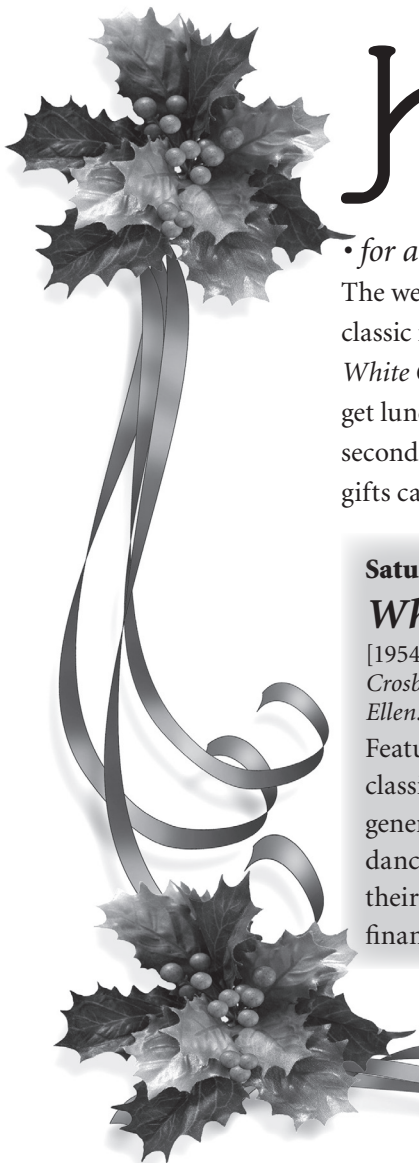

Family Gives Back in More Ways Than One

When it comes to charitable giving, it's a family affair for Lawrence R. Krupp, his wife Melanie, and son Josh. As a trustee in a family-run charitable foundation, Krupp has long known the value of giving back.

"My parents have always been charitable," says Krupp, a resident of Mount Prospect since 1987. "We grew up in Glen Ellyn and my parents were always volunteering and involved in our schools and community, giving both of their time and money."

"After my mom passed away, my dad decided to set up a foundation to honor her and as a way to continue this tradition of giving back."

Thus was born The Leo L. & Roslyn L. Krupp Family Foundation, which since its inception in 1997 has donated thousands of dollars to charities and not-for-profits including the Mount Prospect Public Library Foundation (MPPLF). In a telephone conversation about charitable giving, Krupp easily recalls details from some 50 years ago, describing visits to his local library as a kid. Even then, Krupp says he

understood how lucky he was to have a library filled with so many amazing books or a place to simply hang out with his friends.

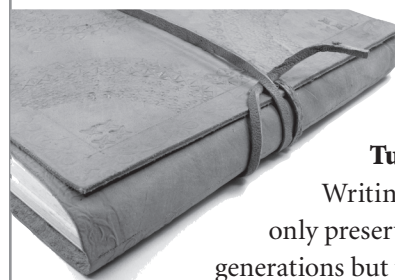

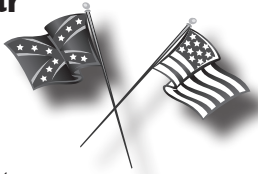

Medicare Advantage & Prescription Drug Programs: *Now Is the Time to Shop*

One of the best ways seniors can save money is to shop around for Medicare Part C and Part D programs during Open Enrollment.

The deadline for enrollment decisions by seniors on Medicare is December 7—sooner than last year! During this time, recipients may switch to another Part D prescription drug plan or from a Medicare Advantage plan to a traditional plan or vice versa.

Why look at other programs even if you are happy with your current plan? Because insurance companies often change their plans year-to-year, especially Medicare Part D drug plans. Some drug costs increase; others may be more difficult to get. Also, your list of drugs may have changed, and another plan may work better. As for Medicare Advantage programs, which are similar to an HMO or PPO, new this year is a five-star quality rating plan to help you make the best choice. According to an article in the *Detroit Free Press*,

Dr. Berwick of the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) noted that premiums for 2012 Medicare Advantage programs on average are decreasing. When comparing plans, you will want to check the premiums, deductibles and other costs, whether your current doctors accept the plan, if you need to get referrals, and any other factors that may be important to you. So, whether you are a senior on Medicare or a family member helping out an aging relative, now is the time to review your options.

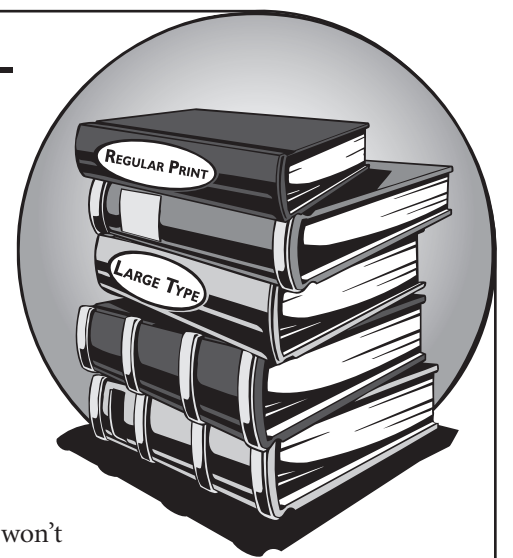

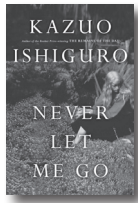

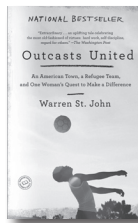

Coffee & Conversation

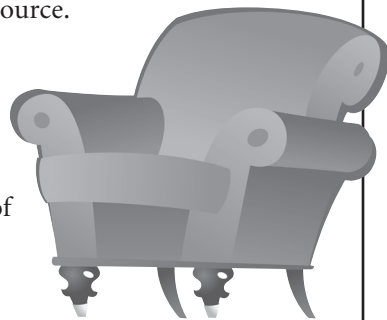

his love of libraries and education through his family's foundation. A certified public accountant, Krupp enthusiastically describes the foundation's yearly process of determining where and to whom to make donations. The trustees, including Krupp (who goes by Larry), his two brothers, his sister, and a cousin, begin sharing ideas in late May. He says the emails begin flying back and forth as the discernment begins.

"It's such a powerful process because it allows us to look at who we are, what we believe in, and to discuss the values that are important to us as a family," says Krupp. "Writing the check is great, but getting to the heart of why we give to certain organizations or support certain causes is what's really important."

Once common ground is established, the family sits down with

their father Leo to decide where to send the annual contributions. Each trustee is then allotted additional funds to donate to charities of his/her own choosing, allowing the family to impact communities all across Chicago and Los Angeles, where one of the brothers resides.

"For my individual family the decision to donate to the Mount Prospect Public Library Foundation is an easy one," explains Krupp. "We love the library. It is such an important part of the community, and from the very beginning we have always felt right at home here ever since we began bringing our young son to the Saturday morning programs."

That son is now in high school and a part of a new legacy of giving. The Krupp Foundation recently added the five grandchildren to its donor roster allowing them to select two charities to bestow \$100 each.

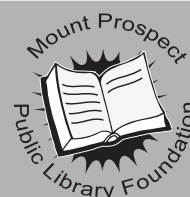
course at Melas Park and together raised more than \$700 to benefit MPPLF.

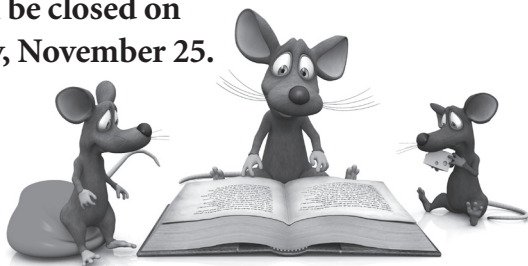
