





At this Senior Session, Connie will talk about how a bag of old letters, discovered in 1984, precipitated an outpouring of recollections by her mother that became the foundation for the book, *Austin Lunch*. Connie uses her experience of documenting family stories she heard as a child to encourage others to record their own life stories for future generations. (R)
