The Federal Reserve Bank of Chicago (FRB Chicago) led the creation of Money Smart Week (MSW) in 2001 with the help of an advisory council composed of forty Chicago-area organizations. This one dedicated week in April offers programs and activities focused on financial literacy,

education, and informed consumerism. The 10th anniversary will be celebrated in April 2011, and the Federal Reserve Bank plans to expand the program nationwide. The FRB Chicago is the seventh district among the twelve regional districts across the U.S. which comprise the Fed, our nation's

central bank. The FRB Chicago continues to welcome new partners and sponsors to this annual series, and successful campaigns have been planned in all five states within the Seventh District (Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Michigan, and Wisconsin) with new cities joining every year. Illinois public libraries have taken an interest in participating in MSW since its inception, and the American Library Association has joined with the FRB Chicago as an active national partner to promote and expand its reach. #### **Online Resources to Create Your Story**







Tuesday, April 19, 1:30 p.m.






