


Going Green It's More Than Recycling

Going green is about considering the planet when you weigh your options. Every day we make decisions that either add to the stress on natural resources or lessen it. For example, the simple choice to buy locally grown food can benefit the environment in several ways: less energy is used to transport the food; fewer chemicals are used to keep the food from rotting on its way to market; and it helps support small local farmers and keeps the land for agricultural use as opposed to development.

The Library wants to help Mount Prospect residents make greener choices. On Saturday, September 25, from 1-3 p.m., the Library will host its first Green Fair. The afternoon will include information and entertainment for every member of the family and is designed to help you understand that you do not have to make radical changes to your lifestyle to have an impact. Small changes, especially if they are made in conjunction with others, can make a difference. The Green Fair will help bring the community together toward the common goal of treading a little more lightly on the earth.

Abraham Lincoln: Self-Made in America Tuesday, October 12-Tuesday, October 26

A world-class traveling exhibit, "Abraham Lincoln: Self-Made in America," featuring reproduction artifacts from the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum in Springfield, Illinois, is coming to Mount Prospect Public Library. This free exhibit is a wonderful learning opportunity, and all are invited to tour it during the Library's regular hours.

The exhibition covers Lincoln's childhood, his self-education, his careers as a surveyor and lawyer, his family life, the Lincoln-Douglas Debates, the 1860 presidential election, the Civil War, the 13th Amendment, the Emancipation Proclamation, his assassination, and other important events in his life. The reproduction artifacts on display, all modeled from originals in the Presidential Library and Museum, include: Lincoln's favorite books; his son Tad's toy cannon; the nameplate from his Springfield home; his stovepipe hat, which he used like a briefcase to hold important papers; a presidential campaign banner; an axe that Lincoln used to chop wood; the bloody gloves found in Lincoln's pocket the night of his assassination; and many other unique and interesting items.

"Abraham Lincoln, the son of a subsistence farmer, came of age during a dramatic transformation in America's economic life. Like many of his contemporaries, he embraced a new emphasis on personal initiative, risktaking, and ambition. He was only 22 when he left his family home to find his own way," notes Illinois State Historian Thomas Schwartz. "After enduring a series of personal failures in business, he became a prosperous attorney, devoted husband and father, successful politician, and, finally, the 16th President of the United States. While Lincoln benefited from close association with a number of powerful friends, his own talents and ambitions combined with hard work and a dedication to self-improvement to produce a unique American specimenthe self-made man."



North America may share the western hemisphere with South America, yet for many of us this continent remains a land of mysterious jungles and lost empires. While the countries of South America share a common history—a land inhabited by indigenous people intruded upon by European conquerors 500 years ago, followed by colonial rule and bitter wars for independence—each country has its own distinct character. Quick green tips

• Warm yourself, not the environment. Put on a sweater. Every one degree you avoid in external heating (by keeping your thermostat down) will cut five percent from your heating bill.

• **Rechargers can be draining.** Unplug your rechargers when not in use. Leaving a recharger plugged into the power outlet means it could be drawing electricity all the time.

• **Don't mask odors.** Find the source of odors and fix them. Air fresheners, deodorizing sprays, and scented candles often contain alcohols, aldehydes, and other chemicals that can irritate eyes and respiratory systems. Open windows, sprinkle borax in the garbage can, and use partially filled dishes of vinegar to dispel odors.

• Why buy when you can borrow? Try borrowing seldom used items, such as power tools and camping gear, from family and friends. It takes a lot of energy to create something new when a perfectly good version is sitting, unused, in someone's garage. Libraries are also great lenders!
