Mural Brings the Outside In, Fosters Curiosity

A cardinal casually perches on the branch of a white oak tree. A white-tailed deer cautiously grazes on the grasses near a patch of violets. A painted

turtle leisurely makes his way out of the wetland. These are just a few of the Illinois state symbols depicted in the Library's newest addition to the public art collection.

Installed in the entryway to Youth Services, this vividly colored mural, entitled *A Gathering at Dusk*, by artist Greg Gove, presents a serene woodland and prairie scene showcasing several natural elements native to Illinois. An added architectural detail to the entryway portrays an organic leaflike element, designed as a canopy to welcome young visitors.

"When planning the mural, we thought it would be nice to expound on that theme with trees and wildlife indigenous to Illinois," explained Blythe Lee, Vice President of Design and Strategic Solutions at Corporate Artworks in Arlington Heights, who has been working with MPPL on its public art acquisitions for over 10 years.

"The artist was given a template



of the canopy so he could paint critters and details peeking through the openings, creating a 'search-and-find' element to the mural," she added. Children of all ages


enjoy looking through the cutouts as they explore the hidden aspects of the mural. This

exploration continues during their visit to the Library, whether to attend a storytime or to pick out a special book.

Greg Gove is no stranger to MPPL.

He also painted *Wild Curiosity*, the whimsical mural in Youth Services of young children playfully interacting with animals and books. *A Gathering at Dusk* was painted on canvas and applied to the wall. The artist has spent the majority of his career based in the Chicagoland area and is now currently living on the Central Oregon Coast.

On the far end of the mural beneath a tree is an open book, fittingly entitled **75 Years** by "author" Greg Gove, paying homage to the Library on the 75th anniversary it celebrated in 2018. This

The mural and canopy architectural detail were purchased by the Irene Scanlon Memorial Fund.


MPPL FanFest 2019

It is representative of the revenge tragedy genre, popular at the time. Titus, a victorious Roman general, returns from the war with the enemy in tow. He publicly refuses to show mercy to his fallen foe, Tamora, Queen of the Goths, and executes her son. Unexpectedly, Tamora is elevated to empress of Rome, locking the two in a titan's battle for justice. The drama may have delighted and at the same time horrified Elizabethan audiences by its pervasive violence throughout. Is there ever a point in this play where justice is finally, truly served? Or is the play caught in an endless loop of retribution? And, if the latter, is loss of humanity the end result or is it just gory spectacle? Join us and find out. *For mature audiences only*. (R)

Bartlett notes that the activities include sensory elements such as textures, sounds, and movement, and are structured to allow for different types of group interactions. The teen volunteers were constant companions, demonstrating and helping, but also chatting with their younger buddies, drawing them out if needed. Teens receive training before the program on how to work with children and how to address issues if they arise.

Teen Buddies Help Kids With Special Needs in *Let's Be Friends*

For children with special needs or who have trouble making friends, a typical Library program might present many challenges. Unfamiliar routines, a roomful of strangers, and upsetting sounds can keep some kids from participating. Staff in Youth Services, aware of the obstacles that can prevent many children from fully enjoying time at the Library, have worked hard to create a better environment for those with special needs.

The Let's Be Friends program provides children in 2nd-5th grades a supportive environment in which to make friends. Teen volunteers are paired with a child buddy to play games, do crafts, share a snack, and more. The program meets for an hour for three

consecutive weeks.

"The programs are really focused on socializing, but will usually have an educational component," says Outreach Librarian Claire Bartlett, "Each Let's Be Friends session has a theme."

During a recent program, teen volunteers arrived first and practiced the day's craft before the younger kids arrived. The teens then started teaching their buddies the craft.

To provide a sense of structure, Bartlett took participants through a visual schedule of the program. Activities have been designed to be quickly teachable and to help build skills. The teens and kids painted to music, everything from classical, to salsa, to the Beatles, with the emphasis on depicting





At the end of the hour, after the younger participants leave, the teens offer their feedback to Library staff. Their suggestions, Bartlett says, help guide future programs.






