Chicago Tribune's Top Workplaces Honors MPPL Once More

The Library has been selected as one of the *Chicago Tribune's* Top Workplaces for 2016. This is the fourth consecutive year that MPPL has been named to this list.

The Top Workplaces are determined based solely on employee feedback. The employee survey is conducted by WorkplaceDynamics, LLP, a leading research firm on organizational health and employee engagement. The Library was ranked in the small category, which represents workplaces with fewer than 250 employees.



MPPL employees were surveyed in June and said they believed the Library was going in the right direction and they liked being part of something meaningful.

"I love to be able to help people and see their reactions when they find what they are looking for," one employee said in the comments section of the survey. Another liked the fact that the Library was "embracing new technologies and growing along with the needs of our community."
