Welcome to Our New Trustee **Sylvia Fulk**

Sylvia Fulk brings financial and administrative experience—and fond memories of storytimes—to her new position on the MPPL Board of Trustees. Fulk was sworn in at the April meeting.

A Mount Prospect resident since 1996, Fulk was most recently Vice President-Client Services for PPM America, an investment management firm. She has also volunteered for Friends of the Library book sales.

Fulk's appreciation for libraries stretches back to her childhood. She recalls going to the Library when she was growing up in Chicago.

"My mom took us to the Saturday storytime program at the Chicago Public Library... We heard stories about Johnny Appleseed and young Benjamin Franklin," she wrote in her application. "All of these cherished memories and positive library experiences have contributed to the person that I am today."

Fulk looks forward to continuing to promote and support the "vital role" that the Library plays in the community and believes technology and the changing nature of how people get

information will be issues the board and staff will be focused on in the coming years.

"I believe MPPL does a wonderful job in outreach to attract patrons of all ages to the Library," Fulk wrote.

Former trustee Barbara Burns resigned from the Board of Trustees at the end of January when she moved out of Mount Prospect and could no longer serve on the board. Fulk's term runs through 2015.

The Board of Trustees consists of seven publicly elected officials who set policy, approve the budget, and hire and evaluate the Library's executive director. The Board meets the third Thursday of each month at 7 p.m. at the Library. Meetings are open, and the public is welcome to attend.

Kathy Murray, Head of Circulation

The Mount Prospect Public Library recently bid farewell to Kathy Murray, who retired after 35 years of service. Her career path led her through many areas of the Library, but, ultimately, she came back to the department where she started—Circulation. "Circulation was always my first love," Kathy recounts.

"When I started, almost everything was done in Circulation. We entered items in the catalog, we did Interlibrary Loan, we processed patron requests—and all with typewriters or by hand!"

In addition to Circulation, Kathy worked in Adult Services and Youth Services, where she served as the school liaison and started the 4th Grade Outreach program. The Teacher Book Bag program can also be traced to one of Kathy's initiatives. "Kathy served in many capacities throughout her tenure and contributed to the Library's success in many ways," reflected Library Executive Director Marilyn Genther. "Although I will miss her greatly, I wish her the very best in her retirement."


Put Your Library Materials on Pause While You Take a Summer Break

Take a vacation from thinking about library materials when you leave town. Before you go, ask Library staff to extend the due dates on up to ten items by Mount Prospect cardholders on many materials. Some materials do not qualify for extended loan, including videos, DVDs, CD-ROMs, materials that have "holds," toys/games/puzzles, and magazines less than one-year old.

You can also "suspend" your hold list while you are gone and then reenter the queue when you return. Call the Fiction/AV/Teen Services Desk and tell them the "stop" and "restart" date. You can also do it yourself using the My Account service online.






Prague Winter: A Personal Story of Remembrance and War, 1937-1948 by Madeleine Albright





The MPPLF inspires growth and learning that enriches the community through culture and education.


