MPPL Hopes to Spark an Interest in Gardening

As a way of cultivating interest in gardening, the Library's Green Committee introduced a seed-starting project in March.

At first the seeds were sprouting under grow lights in the lobby near the Registration Desk. The committee planted the first flat using heirloom pepper and basil seeds, including Long Cayenne, Miniature Chocolate Bell, Alma Paprika, and Kalman's Hungarian. Basil varieties included Genovese, Purple Dark Opal, and Thai.

The flat benefitted from a heat mat to help promote germination. Grow-lights ensured the seedlings got enough consistent light. After a few weeks the peppers and basil were joined by tomatoes and cucumbers.

Later in May (when the nights warm up and are consistently above 50 degrees) they will be transferred to Earthboxes and moved outside to a protected area. Earthboxes are

containers that are great for growing vegetables in small spaces or gardens with poor soil.

The Green Committee's role is to promote and develop green initiatives within the Library and in the community. The seed-starting excitement extends to patrons through programs during the spring and summer that will highlight the various stages of growing vegetables in your backyard.

"We hope that the seed-starting project sparks an interest in patrons to begin growing more of their own food," said Librarian Julie Collins, the chair of the Green Committee. Anyone who wants to learn more about gardening can ask for information at the Reference Desk.

Video Festival Honors *Library Life*

The Library's monthly show highlighting events and services was recognized at a recent regional cable television showcase.

Library Life, hosted by Cathy Cushing, won an Award of Excellence at the Wisconsin Community Media's 2014 Best of the Midwest Video fest. The Village of Mount Prospect's Cable Production Coordinator Howard Kleinstein submitted three shows as a series to the festival.

This is the sixteenth year for the festival but the first year it was open to community media centers in a nine-state area, according to Wisconsin Community Media. The Award of Excellence is the highest of three scoring levels.

The Mount Prospect Park District's *Inside the Park* video magazine also achieved an Excellence award.

Chamber Sets Up Temporary Shop at the Library

The Mount Prospect Chamber of Commerce is temporarily doing business in the Library following a fire that displaced several businesses downtown. The Chamber office is located in Room 130 behind the Registration Desk and is open from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday, Tuesday, Thursday, and Friday and from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. on Wednesday.

"We were happy to help a community partner in a time of need," said Library Executive Director Marilyn Genter.

Patrons will still be able to meet with representatives from Congresswoman Jan Schakowsky's office in Room 130 every Wednesday from 2-5:30 p.m.

On Sunday, February 9, fire destroyed the building at 105 S. Main Street, the home of Sakura Restaurant. While the fire did not spread to the adjoining businesses, including the Chamber of Commerce, Central Continental Bakery, and Picket Fence Realty, smoke and water damage forced them to move to other locations.

Dawn Fletcher Collins said the Chamber hopes to be in a permanent spot by the end of May.

Central Continental Bakery can be found at 17 W. Prospect Avenue, where they expect to be through the beginning of May. Picket Fence Realty's new home is at 400 W. Central Road.

After retirement from a long career in teaching in Maryland, she has continued to write and lecture widely about her experience and survival. Her memoir, *Transcending Darkness: A Girl's Journey Out of the Holocaust*, published sixty-four years after her liberation from the Nazis, is a narrative of fear and hope and resiliency. While it is a harrowing tale of destruction and loss, it is also a story of goodness that still exists in a dark world and of survival and renewal. *This program is cosponsored with Mount Prospect Historical Society.* (R)

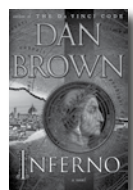

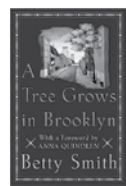

grapples with an ingenious riddle that pulls him into a landscape of classic art, secret passageways, and futuristic science. (NR)

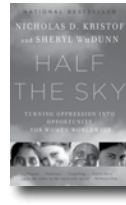


A Tree Grows in Brooklyn by Betty Smith
