Whether you devour several books a week or savor one story for months at a time, you may have noticed similarities in books that are published, sold, borrowed, and read. Not all of these trends are new, but here are ten themes that reflect what Mount Prospect is reading.

- 1. You really liked *The Help.* Kathryn Stockett's debut novel shows no sign of wearing thin, and many of you are looking for something just like it. *The Queen of Palmyra* by Minrose Gwin, *The Dry Grass of August* by Anna Jean Mayhew, and *Like One of the Family* by Alice Childress are just a few of the equally wonderful readalikes you've discovered.
- **2. Don't fence me in.** Genre-blending, in which elements of different types of stories are contained in a single book, is big. Your next read might include mystery, history, romance, humor, spy thriller, and a touch of magic or technology. As long as it fascinates, who cares about the label?
- **3. WE'RE ALL YOUNG AT HEART.** Many adults are finding their way back to the Young Adult and Youth shelves for exciting, original, plot-driven stories. Fans of the *Harry Potter, Twilight*, and

Hunger Games series have learned that where a book is shelved doesn't limit its appeal.

- **4. COLD, BLEAK, AND GRISLY.** International crime fiction didn't start with Stieg Larsson, but *The Girl With the Dragon Tattoo* has awakened a taste for the dark side. Not only are we hungry for Scandinavians Jo Nesbø, Lars Kepler, and Camilla Läckberg, but now we're expanding into other continents as well. Not for the faint of heart.
- **5. Bonnets and Buggies.** At the other extreme, Amish fiction now dominates the gentle reads and religious fiction markets. Yearning for the simple life? Here's your niche.
- **6. Past Loves.** Historical romances have come roaring back into fashion, easily eclipsing contemporaries. Regency periods are the definite favorite as well as anything set in Scotland. More are incorporating adventure, humor, and even magic, so there can be something for everyone.
- **7. Dark and Mysterious.** Though gothic stories fell out of favor for a while, several new releases are exploring isolated settings, brooding atmospheres, and old secrets. Still in the early stages of a comeback, these

- **8. Not Afraid to Go Literary.** You've shown that sometimes you are in the mood for complex, thought-provoking books. Haruki Murakami's *1Q84* and Booker Prize winner *The Sense of an Ending* by Julian Barnes are two examples of books that you have found to be intellectually stimulating.
- **9. Based on the Book.** We love to rediscover stories made into movies and TV. That's why we can't get enough of *A Game of Thrones* by Tatiana de Rosnay, *Sarah's Key* by George R. R. Martin, *Sherlock Holmes* stories, and *Castle* tie-ins.
- 10. Crossing formats and back again.

No list of trends would be complete without mention of how many of us have expanded into audiobooks and e-readers. We enjoy reading on our new gadgets, but print and audio are still in high demand, too.

Tuesday, April 17, 7:30 p.m.






Lark and Termite by Jayne Anne Phillips Wednesday, April 4, 1 p.m.






